

Top 6 Things to Know About the Estate Settlement Process

Here are the top six things you need to know about settling an estate.

- 1. In all events, the will needs to be reviewed and filed and, if needed, the probate court will need to be petitioned to formally appoint the personal representative.
- 2. To protect the assets, you should secure property such as homes, recreational vehicles, artwork, jewelry, and personal documents.
- 3. Asset appraisals may be needed for tax purposes. Any high-value assets should be appraised to determine if there will be taxes due during the estate settlement process.
- 4. Payment of federal and/or state-level estate taxes may be necessary depending upon the size of the estate.
- 5. There are three federal forms that may need to be filed depending upon the estate. These are Federal Estate Tax Form 706, Estate Tax Form 1041, and Final Individual Tax Form 1040.
- 6. Timely asset disbursement, as outlined in the will or trust, is being relied on by your heirs. Distribution should occur as soon as probate is closed and all debts and taxes are paid.
